



# OREGON WORKER RELIEF

## Recognition of Original Languages (RIO) Report | October 2025

More than 100 community partners have come together to create the Oregon Worker Relief, a rapid community-based system that provides temporary financial support, through programs like the Indigenous Language Fund. A fund that supports individuals who provide interpretation services of languages spoken by small ethnic minority groups or languages spoken by indigenous groups.

### Amount Disbursed



**97,563**

RIO has delivered over **Ninety Seven Thousand** in disaster relief throughout interpreters of an ethnic language.



**\$1,991**

Average aid disbursed to the interpreter community members, who provided interpretation services to an Oregonian who speaks a ethnic language.

### Number of Recipients Who Received Aid



**49 Total Individuals**

Have received aid since the opening of the RIO fund in June 2024.



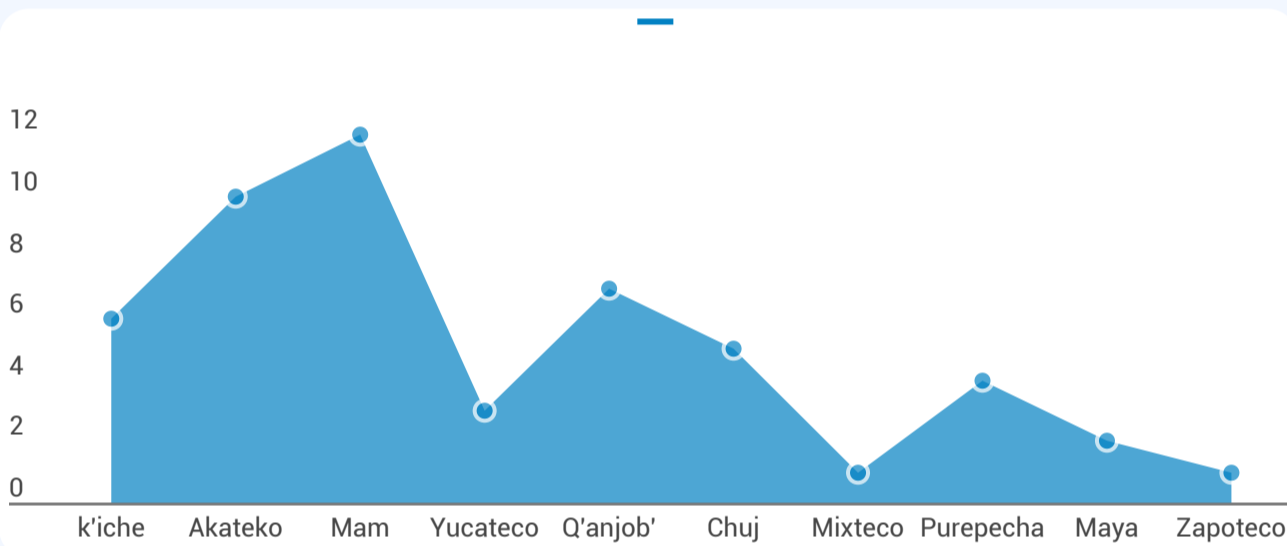
**85% Approval Rate**

Over 85% of applicants receive aid through RIO.

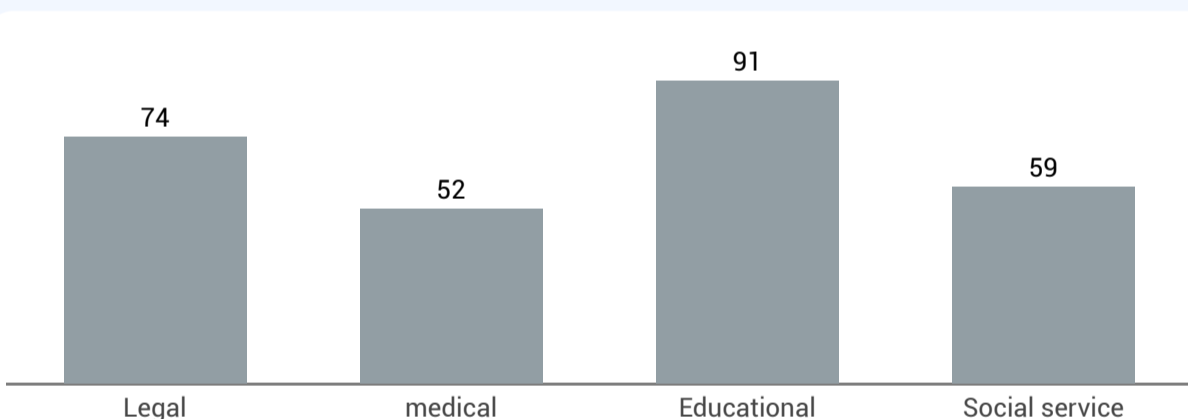
### Financial Relief Disbursed Throughout Oregon

OWR's presence in Oregon is significant. RIO has provided financial relief in 7 of 36 Oregon counties since RIO opening.

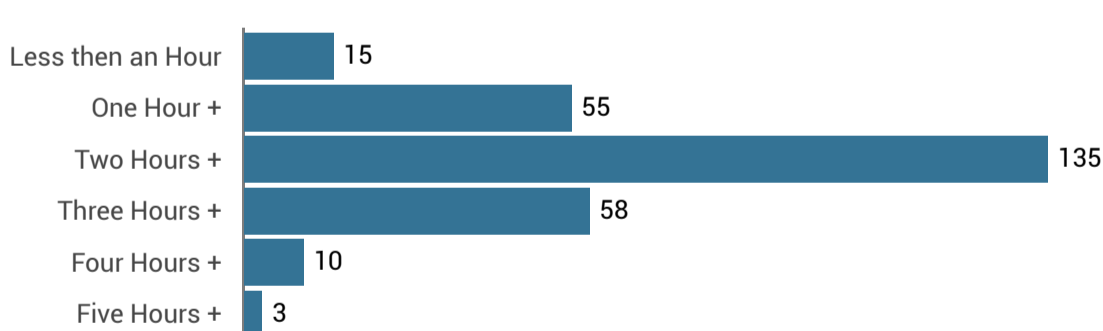
### Languages Interpreted by RIO Recipients
