Recognition of Original Languages (RIO)

Report | February-March 2026

More than 100 community partners have come together to create the Oregon Worker Relief, a rapid community-based system that provides temporary financial support, through programs like the Recognition of Original Languages Fund (RIO Fund). The RIO Fund supports individuals who provide interpretation services of languages spoken by small ethnic minority groups or languages spoken by indigenous groups.

Amount Disbursed



\$134,895.50

RIO has delivered over **One Hundred and Thirty Four Thousand** in disaster relief to interpreters of indigenous or limited diffusion languages.



\$1,420

Average aid disbursed to the interpreter community members, who provided interpretation services to an Oregonian who speaks an indigenous or limited diffusion.

Have been approved since the opening of the RIO fund in June 2024.



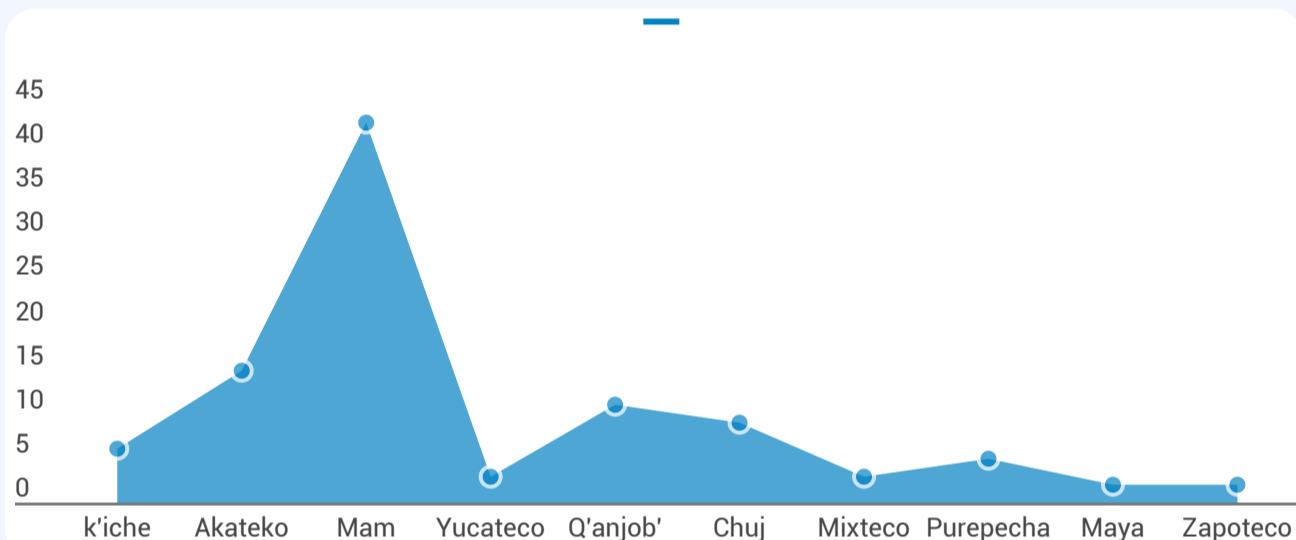
74% Approval Rate

Over 70% of applications receive aid through RIO.

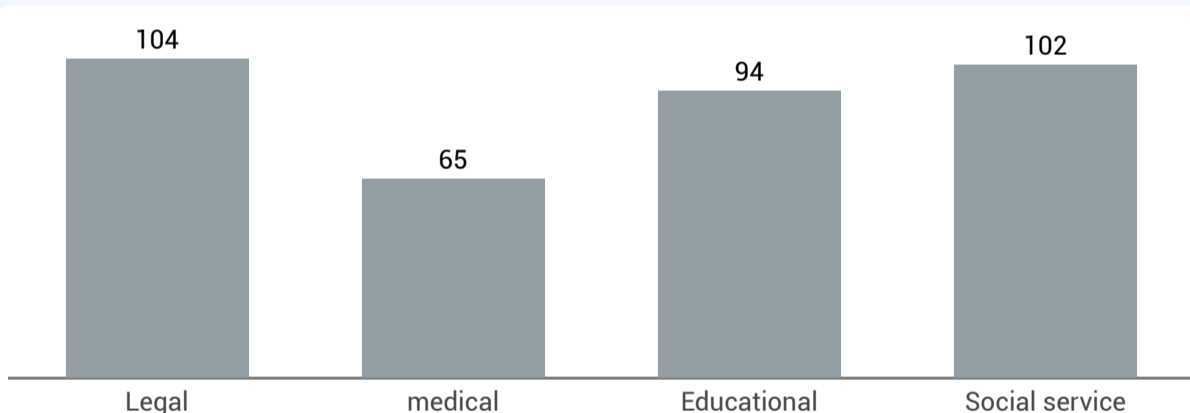
Financial Relief Disbursed Throughout Oregon

OWR's presence in Oregon is significant. RIO has provided financial relief in 8 of 36 Oregon counties since RIO opening.

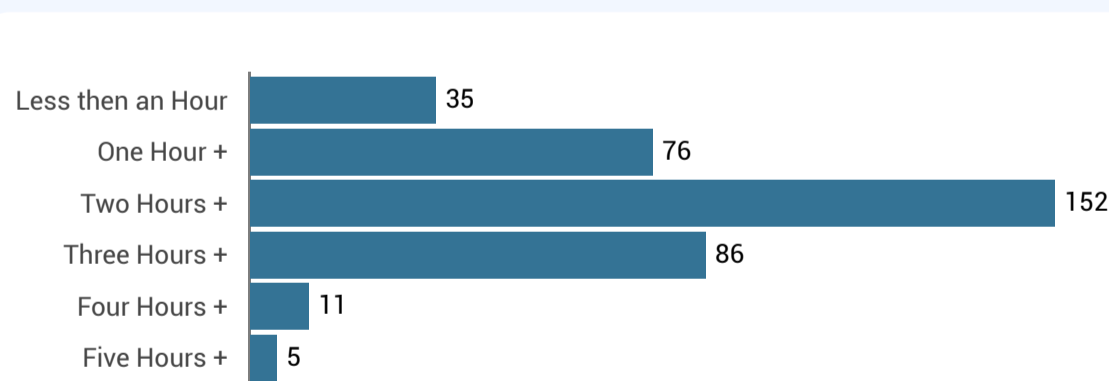
RIO Recipients' Interpretation Languages
